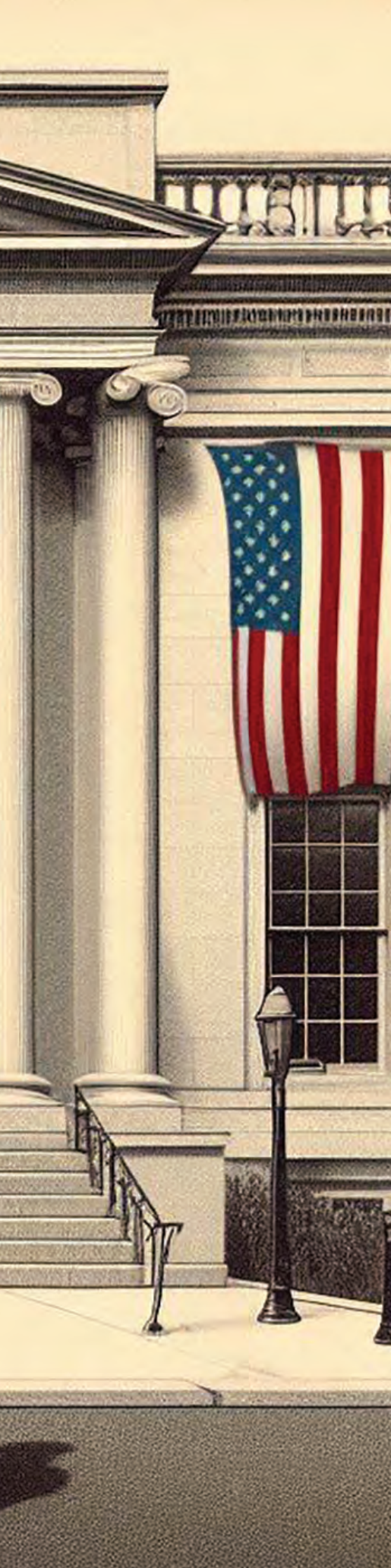

He was decked out in a National Park Service regulation shirt and green miniskirt, pantyhose, black spike platform go-go boots, a flaming red wig and Kabuki-style theatrical makeup. Drag queen NPS ranger “Patti Gonia” towered over Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland as she stood at the gates of New York City’s Stonewall National Monument and interviewed him in commemoration of pride month.

“Tell me, in your own words, why places like Stonewall are so important to telling America’s story,” Haaland inquired of Gonia.

He replied: “That’s a good question. I think it’s because queer rights are more under attack than ever.”

director is Tyler Cherry, a transgender activist. Lifestyle choices aside, Cherry seems to have a taste for Marxist revolution and was recently taken to task on X for posting comments that equated police to the KKK and called them "slave patrols." He unabashedly sides with Palestine in the war against Israel, and as early as 2018, Cherry called for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to be abolished. Yeah, this person works for the government you fund with your tax dollars. Cherry is obviously well acquainted with what BLM stands for, but not the Bureau of Land Management BLM.

But never fear! Folks at the DOI are so laser focused on solutions that in October of 2023, Secretary Haaland held court with foremost western water expert Billy Idol (yes, that Billy Idol) in her D.C. office to discuss ways to conserve water and make the West more "climate resilient."
