You keep us informed of what's going on. We are also in a drought area in southeastern Colorado. Since 2007, we have had three to four years with normal moisture—eight to 15 inches. The last three springs (2012-2014)—enough rains go to summer pastures half to two-thirds stocked. Most ranches have sold half or all their livestock. We're fortunate to still have two-thirds of our cattle by lots of hay management and lots of luck.
